JACK & PAT BURNS

This year Eye Care International profiles Pat & Jack Burns of Kent, Ohio.


Jack and Pat met at Cleveland State University in undergraduate school in 1967 and married in 1968. A typical college romance which turned into a not so typical marriage. Both Jack and Pat, two idealistic love birds decided to go off and change the world by joining the Peace Corps. Nearly two years in the interior of Panama, learning Spanish, working in agriculture and health and nutrition taught them far more than they could have ever imagined.

Jack and Pat left Panama in 1971 and moved back to Ohio to the small University town Kent to attend graduate school. Pat majored in special education and Jack in rehabilitation counseling. Pat became a special education teacher and Jack became a case manager for the developmentally disabled and their two boys were born.

In 1979 Jack and Pat traveled to war torn El Salvador to adopt their 7-month-old daughter. Two years later they made a second trip to bring home their 22-month-old second daughter. What they saw in El Salvador at that time opened their hearts to the needs of the victims of the war, the orphaned children.

Amid the joyful chaos of raising four active children and working in their chosen careers, Jack and Pat committed to Concern for Children, a not-for-profit parent support group for those seeking international adoption and supporting orphanages in Latin America. They also continue to provide support to three government sponsored orphanages in El Salvador

The Burns have worked with church building projects in Nicaragua, Honduras, and Panama, and continue to guide groups traveling to the Salvadoran orphanages. Since their 'retirement' over fifteen years ago, one of Jack and Pat's greatest joys is their involvement with Eye Care International. Living in the same town of Eye Care International as the founder Dr. Bill Brinker opened the doors quickly to volunteering at the monthly work sessions. Jack and Pat signed on for their first trip with Eye Care International in 2011. They continue to be active and key participants every year since, not only during the two week mission, but during the prescreen as well. It is a special way to give back to the country that has given them so much. How lucky we all are!
